






## "You're not made to stay in just one diocese. No, Mother Julie, your vocation is to travel throughout the world."

Today the Sisters of Notre Dame strive to live out Mother Julie's vision and to present it in all its richness. Mother Julie wanted to prepare young women to take their place in society and she was particularly concerned about those who were poor. And to this day the Sisters centre their mission on Christian education and formation of women and children in those places that are most abandoned. The way they do this varies according to the way that each society has evolved, and according to the location and the culture.


Wherever school attendance remains something for the privileged few, catechesis and parish social activity take on an ever increasing importance. Preparing people for Communion and Confirmation, helping parents in the Baptism of their children, accompanying young people on their discovery of Jesus Christ, supporting the disabled, those who are elderly, alone or sick, visiting prisoners, welcoming immigrants... surely all this is another way of continuing to tell of God's goodness? This is what fires up the Sisters of Notre Dame all over the world, whether in Europe (Belgium, France, Great Britain and Italy), in America (United States, Nicaragua, Brazil and Peru), in Africa (Congo-Kinshasa, Nigeria, Kenya, Zimbabwe and South Africa), or in Asia (Japan).

The spirit of Julie Billiart shines out in other congregations. For example, there is the congregation at Amersfoort (Holland) from where the first Sisters formed in Gand and at Namur in the days of Mother St Joseph. Their early days were difficult with some Sisters leaving and then regrouping under the name of the Bois le Duc Sisters of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. In 1850 the Amersfoort Sisters were behind the founding of the Coesfeld congregation (in Germany) which due to historical circumstances was autonomous. At the end of the 1970s the Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur, and those from Amersfoort and Coesfeld joyfully recognised the ties that united them.

In Zele, in Flanders, some Sisters who looked after the hospital broke off in 1831 at the request of Mother St Joseph and other Sisters of Notre Dame and founded the independent congregation of the Sisters of St Vincent.

Since the 1940s the Sisters of St Mary of Kisantu (Congo-Kinshasa) and the congregation from Harare (Zimbabwe), who were formed by the Sisters of Notre Dame, have been responding to particular aspects of African culture. More recently, in the United States and Great Britain, lay men and women have become associates of the congregation by becoming involved in living according to the spirit of Julie Billiart. This great Notre Dame family is continuing the charism of St Julie as the third millennium begins.


