A team of top Year 10 artists at Wade Deacon have combined 'chav' and 'goth' to design a superlambanana which beat a host of competitors to win a BBC North West pretigious contest appearing on TV with their efforts.

The Design a Superlambanana competition was run by BBC North West Tonight and the Arts Council of England as part of Liverpool's European Capital of Culture celebrations. Over a hundred and fifty schools across the North

West rose to the challenge, with brilliant designs inspired by the culture of the region.

Our winning pupils appeared on North West Tonight on Thursday 1 May with their creation. The judges - North West Tonight's Ranvir Singh, Merseyside

artists Amrit and Rabindra Singh and Sally-Ann Wilkinson from Wild In Art - said the design was 'remarkable'. The Wade Deacon design stood out in part because the pupils chose to reflect youth culture while most others concentrated on grown up themes.

The design will now be painted on to the replica Superlambanana and put alongside over a hundred others in the Go Superlambananas



event next month before joining us at Wade Deacon.

The pupils said their design was inspired by the attitudes of youth in today's society, saying "Youths are often seen in a negative way. We thought we would show positive aspects of cultures that people don't always see."

Half of their Superlambanana is decorated in 'chav' style, the other half like a 'goth' or 'emo.' Like the Superlambanana itself, their design is a bit of a hybrid of teenage

styles - you could say it's a teenage mutant Superlambanana!

WADE DEACON PUPILS EXPERIENCE THE REAL "CHINESE SCHOOL"



A party of fourteen Year 9 pupils and staff from Wade Deacon enjoyed a ten day cultural visit to China's Anhui province as featured in the BBC4 programme "Chinese School" over Easter, the highlight being a visit to our partner No 12 School in Tongling City. Pupils have spent the last eighteen months learning Mandarin with the school's Chinese foreign language assistant and the trip was an excellent opportunity to enhance these skills.

Halton Borough Council has well established links with Tongling City and Wade Deacon has built up a strong partnership with No12 Middle School during this period. This was a reciprocal visit with a party from No 12 School visiting Wade Deacon in 2007.

The focus of the visit was firmly linked to the projects on which the schools have been working jointly, concerning with the Yangtze and Mersey rivers, urban planning and how communities live. These are all highly relevant issues to the Borough of Halton and City of Tongling over the next decade.

The group spent three days in Tongling which was an excellent opportunity for pupils and staff to see a

school operating in China, the highlight for us all was getting to spend times in the homes of families whose hospitality was beyond belief.

Time spent reviewing the Yangtze River and Bridge crossing which bears a striking resemblance to the Mersey gateway was an important element of the visit. A day trip to the spectacular Yellow Mountains was another highlight, viewing the sunrise over the peaks after a 5am start being a memory that will never leave us. We visited the ancient village of Xidi to see the contrast with modern expanding Tongling.

The trip was rounded off with two days in Shanghai to view the world famous urban planning museum to see how the modern planning of the city was built to compliment the environment. This also allowed time for some sightseeing in the old and modern Shanghai, whose Bund district bears a striking resemblance to the Liverpool waterfront.

Mrs Wright, Headteacher and party leader said "This was a fantastic opportunity for the pupils who were excellent ambassadors for the school, their parents and the borough of Halton."



To my surprise interactive whiteboards were used by the teachers - who were experts with the technical equipment!

The third day we observed lessons again in the morning and then we went on to some of the tourist sights like the ancient village of Datong and the bridge in Tongling. Both nights we visited a different pupil's house, which was a great experience to see how the Chinese people live. Tongling was a great cultural experience. I was shocked by how different school was in China. The students marched to lessons promptly and treated us like celebrities! I don't think I will ever sign as many autographs as I did in No 12 Middle School!

When we were in the Yellow Mountains it was an amazing experience. When we got off the coach, there was a cute monkey waiting for us. A cable car ride with fascinating views followed. The project was inspired by our partnership with St Cyprian's School in Ghana, and involved pupils designing, building and playing African instruments. Pupils clearly





ENTERPRISING PLANS FOR WATERFRONT DEVELOPMENT

Year 8 enjoyed a taste of the new National Curriculum this term as they rose to the challenge of Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics Week. Teams of pupils were assigned a plot of land in the multi-million pound



Widnes Waterfront Economic Development Zone which they could develop for a variety of uses. Representatives from each team visited the Waterfront site and reported back to their teams on what the waterfront looked like and how it could be improved.

In ICT lessons, pupils created a variety of advertising banners and videos to market their

plans, while in Technology and Maths lessons they produced accurate scale models of their Waterfront area along with futuristic designs for public buildings. In Science lessons pupils studied how bird anatomy is adapted to life in the real world, and how architects draw inspiration for buildings from bird physiology.

The week of enterprise culminated in a celebration assembly at which pupils shared the fabulous work they had produced. In a range of stunning displays, each group showed the work they had been making during the week including scale models of buildings, aerial views of the waterfront, interior design plans for future

TRIPLE AWARD HONOUR AT BAFTA

Wade Deacon High School has been recognised by the Specialist Schools and Academies Trust (SSAT) for adding extra value to students' GCSE achievements.

The school picked up the prestigious High Performing Schools Award in March. This award is presented to schools that achieved above 60% 5 A*-C at GCSE including English and Mathematics in 2007; more than double the Prime Minister's target for schools across the country in four years time! The school also won an additional award for being in the top 20 most improved schools nationally. Mrs Wright, Headteacher said "It was a great honour to be presented with this award which recognises the hard work, dedication and commitment to excellence of our pupils and all the staff at Wade Deacon. We are all very proud of the achievement of our pupils which keep this school on the national map. We are also in the top 2% of schools nationally for our contextual value-added from KS2 to KS4 as well as achieving very high GCSE grades."

CARNEGIE CHAMPION SCHOOLS YEAR 9 SEMI- FINAL

Wade Deacon has booked a return trip to the Carnegie Champion Schools at RAF Uxbridge, for an unprecedented third consecutive year. The result came after a scare from London based Royal Grammar School, High Wycombe.

The Carnegie Schools Champions of 2006 were quickly out of the blocks and raced into a early 10-0 lead courtesy of two tries and conversion from lively hooker Alex Clare.

Late in the first half the London side hit back with tries from their centre and full back. Wade Deacon refused to be beaten as

speedster Joey Ubido increased Wade Deacon's advantage. Royal then hit back again through their running hard loose Captain Dom forward. Speakman who won the Man of the Match award impressive was as in attack as he was in defence and even though suffering a bang to his eye made some bone crunching to tackles change the game.

With the game on a knife edge going into the closing stages a try from Wade Deacon centre James Caton sealed victory for Wade Deacon and sent them through to their third National Final in as many years. Coupled with their three victories in the North West Competition, this makes them the most successful Wade Deacon team to date.

This is the second National final many of the boys have reached this year, as many players within the team play for Halton & Farnworth Hornets who reached their National Final against Castleford Panthers. Coincidentally the Wade Deacon side will go on to face Castleford High School in a repeat of the Carnegie National Final 2007.
